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This session will discuss how effective approaches to vocational excellence can respond to the current and future skills challenges, and be a mobilising factor to modernise VET provision.

The session will build on the examples identified in the mapping studies (European Commission and ETF) identifying different approaches to vocational excellence. It will also involve the key partners from the first 2019 Erasmus+ pilot projects on vocational excellence. Experts from the Sector Skills Alliances, the Sectoral Blueprints, the Joint Research Centre, the European Institute of Innovation and Technology, Cedefop, ETF, European Cluster Excellence Initiative, UNESCO-UNEVOC as well as international experts may also contribute to the debate.

This session will also discuss the Commission's initiative to establish Platforms of Centres of Vocational Excellence (CoVE), providing insight to ensure an effective added-value for EU level support, and ways to take the initiative forward.


