The combination of an ageing society and rapid technological and social change means that countries increasingly need to develop operational and full-scale solutions to vocationally oriented lifelong learning. Both inside and outside traditional universities we can observe an increased focus on employability, the role of practice and work-based learning, and the need to establish a closer dialogue with relevant labour market stakeholders. Striking a balance between a vocational/professional approach (focus on employability and work-based learning) and a traditional academic approach (focus on abstract, theoretical knowledge) is of crucial importance to higher education in general. This thematic session will provide an opportunity for reflection on recent developments and discussion of future approaches. Thematic workshop 5: Vocational learning in the 21st century: challenges for traditional pedagogies and learning methods

Important parts of vocational education and training take as their starting point a 'situated' perspective on learning, where the individual learns by interacting with others in a real working situation. Progression from the periphery to the core of a relevant activity signals the move from novice to expert. The question asked in this thematic session is whether this perspective and approach can be combined with the scientific, research-based approaches underpinning increasingly specialised disciplines. How can VET combine its traditional focus on practice-based learning with an increasing reliance on research-based knowledge? Will these questions influence the way we organise and support vocational learning in the decades to come?

	Thematic workshop 6: European cooperation in VET: time to move up a gear in a globalised world
	VET policy has been part of the European project since its very start in 1957. European VET consists of a variety of distinct systems adapted to national, regional and local circumstances, which are seen as a guarantee of relevance a response to local labour market needs. At the same time, these systems are und pressure to respond to globalisation of technologies, labour markets, industries and sectors. European policies and programmes support Member States in preparing for the impact of international and global environments on national VE provision. While Erasmus+ mobility prepares individuals to work globally, EU too are improving transparency between systems and qualifications. The question is whether increased European cooperation can better address the accelerating challenges. What should be the focus of European cooperation in the coming decade? What type of cooperation arrangements are needed to match national governance to growing European and international learning and working environments?
